**Statistics**

The average soldier entering DDR is 27 years old and called Amanullah. Officers, comprise 11% of the total numbers and have an average age of 37. Collectively, Tajik's and Pashtuns comprise 74% of the Programme's total numbers – 80% of which are classified as illiterate.

<sup>3</sup> 247 irregular forces (IF) have been voluntarily DDR’d to date but only received food packages as ANBP is not mandated to include them within the “R” programme. The remaining numbers of Irregular Forces are being quantified.

<sup>4</sup> Both the AMF and ANA are recognised operational forces funded by the Transitional Islamic State of Afghanistan. The AMF is being DDR’d to break down the historic command and control structures and patriarchal allegiances that exist between the personnel and the factional leaders. In parallel, personnel are being recruited and professionally trained for the ANA to create a modern deployable and ethnically balanced Army, that is commanded by the MoD and loyal to TISA. The ANA should reach 43,000 by Dec 05 and its full complement of 70,000 before Dec. 07.
